Course Description:

This course is an introductory seminar to the fascinating world contemporary art on a global level. During the classes we will discuss numerous important issues that international contemporary art is currently dealing with, including topics like art and climate change; social (in)justice; politics; the globalisation of art, migration and minorities; personal, national and cultural identity and the arts; archives and cultural memory; art and technology; contemporary theory and (self-)definitions of art; new forms, media and techniques in art, the changing landscape of the infrastructure of arts; collections, museums and galleries; art and commerce, etc. The seminar is thus embracing the most diverse topics of contemporary art, and is open for any students coming from any majors – no specialised knowledge in art history is required to successfully complete the course. In this way the course also attempts to bring many of the inspiring aspects of global contemporary art closer to those who feel that they were less familiar with them.

Course requirements:

A research paper of approx. 6-10 pages (3,000-5,000 words) and its verbal presentation.
