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Course Description:

The course will concentrate on the morphology and syntax of noun phrases, adjectival phrases and adverbial phrases, on the one hand, and the major syntactic and semantic properties of simple and complex sentences, on the other hand. It will serve as a follow-up seminar for the lecture course entitled *2180 Present Day English 2.2. Descriptive Grammar* in two respects: in addition to providing additional opportunity to discuss and clarify some of the issues in the lectures, its primary goal will be to offer advanced practice in the above-mentioned areas of English grammar.

The new seminar materials will be uploaded in the Moodle System by Monday midnight prior to the class.

A student may miss three classes at most (for miscellaneous reasons *including* illness or family problems).

Grading will be based on attendance, participation in discussions and two major (mid-term and end-of-the-term) tests.
