Course Description:

The aim of the course is to give on overview of the history of Christian thinking. During the course those ideas and insights will be emphasized that stand in the centre of the Christian understanding of human reality. For this reason, the course will deal with the appearance of the first Christian community, the early Church and the Church of the Middle Ages. The course further aims for a detailed introduction to the ideas of the Pre-reformation and Reformation up to the 20th century, especially focusing on the primary concerns of Protestantism, more closely on the heritage of the Swiss Reformation. The investigation of the church-state relationship from a Christian perspective is also one of the main objectives of the course. Similarly, the ecumenical outlook is part of the inquiry. For this purpose, students will engage in dealing with different sources of Christian thinking.
