<p>Course Description:</p> <p>The objective of this course is to give students an insight into the most important literary works of art by the most canonized poets, novelists and playwrights of English literature from the beginnings till the twentieth century through a selection of fragments of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Early and medieval English literature (Geoffrey Chaucer) • Renaissance (Wyatt, Surrey, Sidney, Spenser, Shakespeare) • The seventeenth century (Donne, Milton) • The beginnings of the English novel (Defoe, Swift, Richardson, Fielding, Smollett) • Romanticism (Blake, Wordsworth, Coleridge, Byron, Shelley, Keats) • The early nineteenth century (Walter Scott, Jane Austen) • Victorian prose (the Bronte sisters, Charles Dickens, Thackeray) • Nineteenth-century poetry (Tennyson, the Browning couple, the Pre-Raphaelites, Swinburne) • The second half of the nineteenth century (Robert Louis Stevenson, Samuel Butler, Thomas Hardy) • The fin de siècle (Oscar Wilde, Henry James, Kipling) • The great experimenters (Joseph Conrad, James Joyce, Virginia Woolf, T. S. Eliot) • Old-new prose (H. G. Wells, Galsworthy, Maugham, E. M. Forster) • Some interesting characters of the twentieth century (D. H. Lawrence, Katherine Mansfield, Graham Greene, Golding) • Twentieth-century drama (from George Bernard Shaw to Pinter) • Poetry in the twentieth century (Walter de la Mare, Auden, Dylan Thomas)
