**Course Description:**

This course will be an irregular one: six walks in the city following a short introduction. We will try to understand the past and present of Budapest. We are going to visit different kinds of museums: the Lutheran Museum, the Hungarian Jewish Museum, the Budapest History Museum, and the Museum of Trade and Tourism. We are also going to visit churches, synagogues and private homes of public figures of past ages. As history and modernity mingle in Budapest, there are countless architectural masterpieces, secret gardens, and small wonders, which are, however, hidden from the unexperienced eyes. How did people live in Budapest during past centuries and how do they live today in this immortal city?
