Course Description

This English-language course focuses on how certain Native Americans nations – especially the Inuit, the Dakota, the Natchez, and Peruvian Aboriginals – have been depicted in the earliest written sources by themselves or by others. An effort has been made to rely on such early written sources as represent significant aspects of Native American life, that is, more specifically, of culture, history, and religion at large. Geographically hilghlighted areas will be the Labrador coastline; the Midwest; the Southeast; and the Peruvian Highlands. Students are expected to attend class (three absences are tolerated); to electronically submit a paper, based on individual research concerning a relevant written primary source, two weeks before the end of the examination period at the latest; and to have their choice approved by the instructor beforehand. Lessons will consist of reading and analyzing bits of early documents describing Aboriginal life and discussions about them. Active student participation is expected.
