Course Description:

"How does Duolingo work? What is adaptive testing? What can we learn from the machine learning literature about vocabulary teaching? What is spaced repetition and the forgetting curve? - Topic 3 Assessment, testing, competence, performance
- Topic 4 Individual differences in language learning (motivation, aptitude, strategies, beliefs, etc.)
- Topic 5 New and relevant issues in applied linguistics (machine learning, artificial intelligence, etc.)

Requirements: weekly attendance (3 absences are allowed altogether);
