## **Course Description:**

The course is designed to offer an overview of the comprehensive development of Chinese cinema starting from 1949 till the early 2000s, and in parallel with how western scholarship and audiences got acquainted with Chinese cinema during this period.

The module touches upon the historical environment, that shaped Chinese cinema, and the undisputed role of international film festivals as gatekeepers in bringing certain Chinese films to prominence in the West. It applies an interdisciplinary approach to explore the wider socio-political and also artistic aspects of the relationship between Chinese cinema and these festivals.

By the end of the course, students will have a basic understanding of the most important phases in the development of Chinese cinema, the most acknowledged Chinese directors and films, they will also develop a general idea about the processes that have facilitated the recognition of these filmmakers and their films.
